Marion County Children Need Your Help Become an advocate for an abused or neglected child



In Marion County, over 970 children that are abused, abandoned and neglected are in the child welfare system, most of which are 10 years of age and younger. Their fate has been turned over to the state. They now depend on lawyers, judges, social workers and foster parents to make sure they are safe, protected and provided the services necessary to overcome their circumstances.

Children in foster care exhibit higher rates of mental illness, school failure and involvement with the criminal justice system. Due to the lack of proper parenting and adult role modeling, their ability to cope with the stresses and strains of everyday life is typically compromised.

The Guardian ad Litem Program, a largely volunteer based organization, that advocates for the safety and wellbeing of abused and neglected children, gives lay citizens the power and authority to make a difference. By assigning a trained volunteer to each child, it guarantees a higher level of protection and oversight and ensures decision-makers are focused on the child.

Regrettably, due to the lack of volunteers, not all of "our" children are provided this safety net. They must rely on "the system" for help.

STUDENTS LEARNED ALOT AT LEADERSHIP RETREAT

The Students Against Destructive Decisions Youth Advisory Board (SADD YAB), comprised of two to three individuals from each club nominated by their peers, participated in the annual leadership retreat at the beginning of June. This group of exceptional young people come together from all around the county, and from all walks of life, to make lasting impacts within their community! This year's retreat included members from North Marion High School, Belleview High School, Forest High School, Concerned Citizens of Chatmire, Osceola Middle School, Belleview



Middle School and the Ocala Sea Anchor Division Navy Sea Cadets Corps clubs. The purpose of the retreat is to help returning members and new members learn how to work together, teach various leadership skills and hopefully, build lasting friendships.



The retreat was held at the Montgomery Presbyterian Conference Center, located in Starke, FL. The conference center is situated in the forest, between two crystal clear, spring fed lakes. While we lodged in a brick and mortar building, make no mistake that we were deep in the woods! Nature was everywhere and some of the campers were definitely outside their comfort zones, not to mention some of the adult volunteers. Even inside, we were not safe from the very large, very hairy

spiders! The lodge we stayed in was set up dormitory style, with 20 bunks in each wing, separated by a large meeting space and commercial kitchen. We were able to accommodate 23 youth and 4 adults.

Upon arrival, the youth participated in an ice breaker activity and then were split into their color war teams. Throughout the 4-day, 3-night weekend, just about every activity involved breaking into their teams after meals and competing for points., which could be earned for just about anything from winning competitions, answering questions correctly, and figuring out riddles, all of which were part of the lessons being instilled. Points could also be earned for participation, kindness, leadership and even keeping their bunks tidy.



The youth were exposed to several leadership skill building activities, including public speaking, team work, policy change and communication. One of the favorite lessons was on how to tell the difference between a boss and a leader. The teams were given 30 words that describe the traits of either a boss or a leader, and they had to separate the words into piles. They found it interesting that there is sometimes a very fine line between the two.



By the end of the weekend, everyone was sufficiently exhausted and ready to head home. It was amazing to see this dynamic group of young people come together, some of them total strangers, and become a cohesive unit who is ready to get to work and make some positive changes in Marion County!




