



Grant Writing Tip

Focus on solutions more than problems in your grant application

Here are a few quick tips when writing your grant application:

- 1. Talking too much about problems (as opposed to solutions) can give your proposal a negative vibe. Remember: A real person is going to read your proposal, so you want to do everything you can to instill positive emotions, much like in storytelling. Plus, grant makers want to know how you're going to accomplish your objectives even more than why.
- Target a specific project. The majority of grants are awarded to a specific cause as opposed to just general support. By focusing your grant application on a single project, you will increase your chances of getting funded. And be detailed—this will show that you've clearly thought through how the project will be executed.
- Be a good story teller. Imagine that it's your job to read grant proposals, hour after hour after hour. Eventually they're all going to sound the same—unless you come across one that inspires you or tugs at your heartstrings. Think about this: How can you get the person reading your proposal to fall in love with your organization? The key lies in the story you tell. If you can perfect the art of storytelling, your grant proposals will stand out. With word and character limitations, this can be a challenge.
- Lose the \$10 words. This is not a doctoral dissertation! The best grant proposals are easy to read, concise and understandable. Always (Watch the acronyms too!)
- Differentiate yourself. Tell how your organization's work is different from other nonprofits in order to set yourself apart. That said, you significantly up your chances of getting a "yes" if you can set your organization apart from the masses.



I Want to Help - Individuals

Although not everyone can foster or adopt, we ALL can do something! Whether you are a business, individual or non-profit, you can help meet the needs of vulnerable children and families in your community! Florida has partnered with CarePortal to make sure interested individuals and groups are aware of real-time opportunities to help.

SIGNING UP IS FREE AND EASY ~ TRY IT NOW

For those offering resources (i.e. support groups, food/ clothing, etc), we encourage you to review the site to see if your programs are listed. Further, you will have the ability to connect with Aunt Bertha staff directly through the portal who can assist with listing your programs. That way those in need searching for resources will be able to see resources that are available to them in their community.

You can claim your organization or sign up your organization at no cost. You will be able to directly refer your customers to any organization/resources on the site. This is a great way to leverage your resources. You will also be able to pull data.

Your program may already be listed and just needs to be "Claimed."

Claiming your program allows your organization to:

- Update your services so more of the people you serve (and less of those you cannot help) come to you based on your service description.
- Update your contact information and assure a person in need gets the dignity of a response to their request for help
- Gain access to **free** features like:
- Referral and outcome tracking tools
- Referral screening tools
- Appointment scheduling
- Reporting about your program
- Team Management gives multiple users on your team permission to edit your programs and see reports.
- The Screening Tool adds an additional layer of questions which ensures that a person who is interested in your program is eligible for those services.
- The Appointment Scheduler allows people to schedule appointments with your program directly through the platform.





Dr. Jason M. Hunt is an assistant professor of addiction medicine at the University of Florida College of Medicine, where he joined the faculty in 2017 to practice addiction medicine at the UF Health Florida Recovery Center.

Dr. Hunt earned his medical degree from the University of Illinois in 2002. He then completed an obstetrics and gynecology residency at the University of Louisville in 2006. He completed a fellowship in addiction medicine at the University of Florida in 2017.

Before becoming an addiction medicine physician, Dr. Hunt worked as an advanced drug and alcohol counselor in Alabama and Tampa. Currently, his responsibilities include evaluating impaired professionals and caring for patients in the alcohol and drug detoxification unit at UF Health Shands Psychiatric Hospital. His interests and expertise are in ob/gyn, specifically opioid use disorders in pregnancy, substance use disorders, the evaluation and management of dual-diagnosis substance use disorders and substance-related impairment.

Paid Work Experience Opportunity Questions and Answers

1. What is Paid Work Experience?

Eckerd Workforce Development through CareerSource Citrus Levy Marion connects employers and young adults, ages 18-24, in the belief that businesses need trained workers, young people need good jobs and communities need strong economies. Paid Work Experience participation is a viable way to eliminate barriers such as lack of experience and soft skills that can stand in the way of gainful employment.

2. How long is a Paid Work experience?

A Paid Work Experience lasts for up to 12 weeks or 360 hours, whichever comes first, with a maximum of 30 hours worked each week. The trainee could work 9 weeks for 360 hours, but cannot work over 40 hours per week. The schedule during the course of a week will be determined by the worksite.

3. Where does the pool of candidates come from?

CareerSource Citrus Levy Marion has an active pool of participants, 16-24 years old, that are currently seeking employment in a variety of industries. Participants will have completed work readiness training, and also received relevant occupational certification through our Workforce Services. Candidates will also have a hands-on Career Coach who will provide support throughout the Paid Work Experience.

4. Who selects the Paid Work Experience Participant?

As the potential employer, you do. All candidates will attend an internal selection first to determine suitability prior to you receiving any resume for review. After that, you may interview and make your choice. Note: all agreements must be executed prior to participant starting.

5. How is the participant paid?

Eckerd Workforce Development Services has contracted with Excel HR to cover the payroll costs. The worksite has no liability for payroll, taxes and related costs. Trainees will be paid biweekly at a set rate of at least \$8.56 per hour, and up to 90% of the typical entry wage based on preferences given by the business. All Paid Work Experience participants will be covered by Florida's Workers Compensation Policy.

6. How do I get started?

Just call or email today, and our employment specialist will schedule a convenient appointment to review your needs, and begin searching for a candidate.

Healthy Families <u>Lake/Sumter/Marion</u>™

What is Healthy Families Lake/Sumter/Marion?

Healthy Families Lake/Sumter/Marion (HF) programs provide free, voluntary parent coaching and support services that increase the knowledge and skills of parents so their children can grow up healthy, safe, nurtured and ready to succeed in life. Community-based programs combine to form the nationally accredited HF statewide program which is proven to prevent child abuse and neglect before it ever starts. Parent coaching and support is more frequent in the beginning and tapers off as the family becomes more stable and self-sufficient. Services can last up to five years, depending on the needs of the family.

When Should I Make a Referral to Healthy Families Lake/Sumter/Marion?

A referral can be made if the family:

- Is expecting a baby or has a newborn less than three months old
- Has an open investigation
- Is receiving case management services
- Has had prior involvement in the system and the case was closed

Because this is a voluntary program, HF cannot replace mandated services in situations where a case would have been opened or would remain open if HF was not involved.






